## The Good Wife star tells us about his celebrity pals, backstage riders and why he's still a party boy at heart

ollywood actor, stage star, author, small-screen sensation and now singer. It really seems there is nothing that Alan Cumming can't do!

From his humble beginnings in rural Scotland to becoming one of the most respected faces in the industry, this all-rounder has managed to straddle the big screen – with the likes of *X-Men 2* and *Romy And Michele's High School Reunion* under his belt – alongside a stage career spanning almost 30 years.

His TV credentials are even more impressive, with guest appearances on *Sex And The City, Frasier* and *The L Word*, along with his ongoing lead role as Eli Gold in the Emmy-nominated drama series *The Good Wife*.

In three decades, the actor has kicked countless goals, but reaching the big 5-0 last year doesn't rank highly – as New Idea discovers after quizzing the star about being 50 and fabulous.

'I like that when I say I'm 50, people say: "No, you're not!"' he laughs. 'That's good!

'I still seem to be able to exist in pretending to not be the age I am. I keep waiting to not feel like a horny 22-year-old, but it just hasn't happened yet! 'There are certain rules
I observe – drinking enough
water and getting enough
sleep included. I commit to
my party-ness, I stay fit in
order to be able to party well!'

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Luckily for Alan, he lives in one of the world's ultimate adult playgrounds: New York – a city he and husband Grant have lived in for more than 15 years.

'It's not a place to live if you want a quiet life. When I leave my apartment, I feel like an adventure is about to begin — that's what I like about the city. You meet people in the street and end up on a balcony somewhere... Crazy things happen.'

It's this craziness that sits well with the less-than-conventional performer. Now openly bisexual, Alan was married to actress Hilary Lyon for eight years before starting a relationship with a man in the late '90s. At the threat of tabloid exposure, he made the decision to

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But being such an open book doesn't come without its annoyances, says the star.

'Mostly, it's fine, but sometimes people feel that they can ask you things that they wouldn't dare ask another celebrity,' he says. 'Just because I'm open doesn't mean we have to keep talking about that stuff.'

A prime example

of his honesty is the warts-and-all memoir he released in 2014, Not My Father's Son.
In the book, Alan tells of the violent beatings he endured as a child from his abusive father.

'I was nervous before it came out, because I was revealing a side of myself that was huge and totally a shock to people,' he admits.

'I wrote the book because I felt I had to tell that story, it was something I wanted to, you know, expunge. My biggest worry was how it would affect my mum and brother, but it turns out it has been a really positive thing.'

It's this realness that sets him apart from other A-listers who live in the Tinseltown bubble.

'I'm a famous person whose public image is actually really similar to the way he is,' explains the Tony Award winner. I'm not a diva and I don't make any crazy demands, but in saying that, I don't take any \*\*\*\* either!'

Currently in Australia for his one-man cabaret show, *Alan Cumming Sings Sappy Songs*, the actor recounts his decidedly un-diva backstage rider.

'Hummus, crudites and vodka, that's it. Just give me a couple of celery sticks and a Martini and I'm fine!'

He follows hot on the heels of Hugh Jackman, whose cabaretstyle show toured the country to sell-out audiences late last year. But Alan isn't intimidated by the Aussie stage veteran.

'I think we're very different!' he laughs. 'There's room enough for us all. We worked on *X-Men 2* together, he's lovely. Hugh's more of a musicals man – and my musical prowess is limited!'

While Hugh is formidable

competition, Alan does have a secret weapon: Liza Minnelli.

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'I had dinner with her and talked to her a lot about doing a cabaret show of my own.

She taught me some really great lessons and we've since performed together in a show.

'I hadn't seen her for a while, but she was very integral in my decision to start doing this type of work. She was supportive.'
